May is Museum Month!











Plan to attend the Lilac Festival in Franktown on May 27th!


You'll see antique displays, tour the 200 year old St. James Anglican Church, and can take a historical wagon ride down Lilac Lane!

May Theresa Cornell

was born on May 11, 1877 in Carleton Place. Her father George was the property assessor for the town and a school trustee. May was the sixth of eight children and attended Victoria and Prince of Wales schools.

By 1901 she was working as a nurse at the Royal Victoria Hopspital in Montreal, where she had trained.

Always adventurous, May enjoyed outdoor activities. She loved fishing and canoeing.

The Cornell home was on Moffatt Street, on the north bank of the Mississippi River. Home for a visit, May was sitting on the shore on July 11, 1903 watching paddlers from the Carleton Place Canoe Club practicing.

The four-man canoe capsized opposite the Cornell home where the water of the Mississippi River is deepest. All four paddlers were thrown into the water. Two of the boys, McGillivray and William Genoe, could not swim.

May Cornell saw the boys were in trouble and immediately set to the rescue with her boat. One boy climbed in and another was towed to shore. Genoe had not yet surfaced when Captain Baldy Welsh arrived in his boat. He was able to see Genoe below the water, dove in and pulled the young man to the surface. Witnesses had called all available doctors and soon Drs. McFarlane, Muirhead and McIntosh arrived. Resuscitation took twenty minutes before young Genoe began breathing.
